You can dispose of oil and grease by placing it in an empty milk carton, vegetable can, plastic butter container, or "zip lock" bag and put that in your garbage.

Dispose of oil and grease properly and your drainpipes and wallet will thank you!

Holiday Crime Prevention Tips

The Holiday Season is upon us and many of you are making Holiday plans and getting your house ready for visits, decorations, and gifts.

Preparing your home and starting your Holiday shopping can be fun, but please remember to take precautions. Although we're fortunate to live in a very safe neighborhood, the holiday season can attract criminals from any distance. Following are some crime prevention tips for home & while shopping:

At Home:

- * Keep all doors & windows locked when leaving your house.
- * If leaving for an extended period of time over the holidays, leave on some lights and TV or radio. to give the impression that someone is home.
- * Hide large gifts that can be seen through windows.
- * Don't leave a key outdoors.
- * Do not leave your garage door open.

While Shopping:

- * If possible, go shopping with a friend. Criminals are less likely to approach you if you're not alone.
- * Lock **all** valuables & purchases in your trunk **before** reaching your destination.
- * Never leave valuables in plain sight in your vehicle.
- * Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- * Make sure cashiers return your credit card.
- * Purses should be held close to the body.

- DO NOT put leaves in garbage or recycling carts

Holiday Recycling Information

This information is being provided in this Newsletter as there WLL NOT be a separate December Newsletter.

You CAN Put These Items in Your Recycle Cart:

- non-metallic wrapping paper and Gift bags (handles removed)
- tissue paper
- cardboard
- gift boxes and shoe boxes
- aluminum foil and food trays (rinse to remove food)
- greeting cards, envelopes, gift cards, and tags
- old calendars (remove metal or plastic coils; staples OK)

DO NOT Put These Items in Your Recycle Cart:

- No foil or metal-looking wrapping paper or gift bags
- No ribbons, bows, beads, string, garland, or tinsel
- No holiday decorations (lights, bells, ornaments, etc.)
- No bubble wrap
- No plastics toys
- No batteries, electronics, or
- No artificial Christmas trees

Christmas Tree Recycling

Drop-off locations for cut, real Christmas trees will be announced in January. Ornaments, tinsel, lights, stands, and plastic bags **must be removed from the tree before** it is dropped off. For details, visit www.acwastewatcher.org.

Wreaths are not accepted at the Christmas tree recycling locations. Wreaths may be placed in your garbage cart.
