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Fireworks

It's hard to believe, but July 4th is not that far away, so it's time to discuss Fireworks Rules. Fireworks are part of our Nation's celebration of July 4th, and we hope you enjoy this special holiday. BUT, there are laws that govern fireworks use in the city limits. So, while enjoying your holiday, please follow these laws:

According to the Fort Wayne Parks and Recreation Department, Fireworks are NEVER allowed in any Fort Wayne Parks. This includes the Lafayette Place Park in our neighborhood and the Esplanade. This is a City Ordinance, and it will be enforced. Anyone who sees a citizen setting off fireworks in Lafayette Place Park or the Esplanade should call the police department at 427-1222.

The Fort Wayne City Ordinance states:

Fireworks may be used only on the user's property, on the property of someone who has consented to the use of fireworks, or at a special discharge location designated by the State Fire Marshal for the discharge of consumer fireworks.

- Fireworks may be used only from 5:00 pm to 11:00 pm from June 29-July 3 and again, from July 5-9.
- July 4th hours are extended from 10 a.m. until midnight

Penalties for violating the fireworks law can range from a Class A misdemeanor up to a Class C felony.

Anyone with a fireworks-related complaint is to call the Fort Wayne Police Department at 427-1222.

A Health Hazard Among Us

There is a lot of poison ivy in our neighborhood. Some properties have an overabundance, and it is very dangerous. **Poison ivy** leaves grow in clusters of three on vines that can grow up into trees and trail along the ground.

Mistaking these for weeds and pulling them out can have hazardous results.

A glyphosphate-based herbicide **concentrate**, such as RoundupTM, KleenupTM, or a specific poison ivy killer, should be mixed with water 3 times the normal strength. **Ready-mix herbicides are not strong enough to destroy poison ivy.**

DO NOT BURN THESE PLANTS – burning can cause severe lung problems. For information about these plants and how to **safely** get rid of them, there is a good step-by-step list at www.gardensalive.com

Be A Good Neighbor

Summer weather allows us to open our windows and doors and spend more time outdoors. But summertime also brings out noises and activities that can be disturbing to our neighbors.

Make sure ONLY YOUR household is listening to your music, laughter, and conversations. Sounds are magnified at night, so be considerate when you have outside gatherings and cookouts. And please do not leave the volume cranked up on your car radio while it is parked outside.

West Nile Virus - Be Proactive

This is a good time to be reminded about an extremely important summer danger: the West Nile Virus. The West Nile Virus is a **mosquito-borne** virus that can cause encephalitis (inflammation of the brain) or meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the brain and spinal cord).

Out of the 60 different varieties of mosquitoes, there are three types that have been found to be West Nile virus carriers in the Fort Wayne area, and another type that carries LaCrosse encephalitis.

Mosquitoes need water to multiply, and standing water can be found almost everywhere. Even a wet plastic bottle cap has enough water for the female mosquito to lay her eggs.

The advent of the West Nile Virus makes it even more important to keep your property cleaned up. Clogged gutters, rimless tires, tall grass, and weeds harbor mosquitoes

Prevention includes spraying clothing with repellants containing DEET and applying insect repellant sparingly to exposed skin. Repellants should NOT be applied to children three years old and under. Consider wearing long-sleeved shirts and long pants outdoors during peak mosquito times.
